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STAFF TRAINING

The NEGS and St John's Staff have been vigilant this year in ensuring they are equipped to take the very best care of their students. During the first semester, with the support of the school, the majority of staff have participated in training for Anaphylaxis, Asthma, Diabetes, First Aid and CPR. This accompanies the large amount of training the staff undertake in line with the Wellbeing Program at the school.

The majority of staff now have their First Aid and CPR qualification. Staff have also attended an inservice on managing diabetes as well as successfully completing the online training for Anaphylaxis and Asthma First Aid.

Our aim is to equip staff in all areas of NEGS and St John's with the necessary skills to provide first aid management for our students in the case of most emergencies. All students attending any off campus excursion will be accompanied by at least one or two staff with the above training.

The training has extended across the entire school including Music, Equestrian, Livestock, Shooting, Teaching Staff, Junior School Staff, Sport and Boarding as well as some support staff.

WINTER ILLNESSES

As the winter weather settles in it is timely to remind everyone to please be vigilant in excluding your child from school if they are unwell. In the case of a gastroenteritis related illness it is school policy that students are not permitted back to school until 48 hours post the last episode of vomiting and/or diarrhoea. NEGS and St John's are holding a combined Wellbeing Day on the last day of Term 2, Thursday 23rd June, 2016.

As part of this initiative we have decided that we will support the Foster Care Angels Charity Program.

This charity is specifically concerned with young children and adults who are entering into foster care for the first time. Often these children will leave home with little or no possessions, and no idea what the future holds.

We at St John's and NEGS will be collecting items outlined by the charity and sending them to their packaging offices so that they can create these care packages to distribute to needy children.

Foster Care Angels are very excited that we have come on board with their charity and are looking forward to the many packages that they will be able to give away to those in need.

To make this process efficient and to ensure that we cover all of the needed supplies I have distributed the items between the year groups. These are outlined below. Could students please bring their item on the Thursday and drop off to the MPC just after recess?

Remember that it is the thought that counts, one item is sufficient, and brand names do not matter. If a student cannot supply an item, their time on the day to help us pack for postage is just as appreciated.

The charity asks that all items be new and not preloved and a variety of 'boy' and 'girl' style items.

Transition- Baby bottles and baby dummies.

- Kinder/Year 1- Lead pencils and rulers.
- Year 2- Erasers and sharpeners
- Year 3 & 4- Glue sticks and pencil cases
- Year 5- 12 pack coloured pencils and textas
- Year 6- Blank scrapbooks and A5 size journals
- Year 7- Generic colouring in books, pack of 80 baby wipes.
- Year 8- Combs, hairbrushes and small baby powder.
- Year 9- Roll on deodorant (male and female) and face washers (flannels).

Year 10- Small packet of sanitary pads and hair ties

- Year 11- Individually packaged toothbrushes and tooth paste
- Year 12- Baby socks and baby bibs (velcro or slip over only- not tie up)
- Staff- Money donations to assist in the postage of the packages made.

SPORTS @ NEGS

After watching the State of Origin and after some other media coverage of sports incidents in the past few weeks, I thought it may be timely to send out a reminder about our NEGS Code of Conduct in regards to sport.

It is updated regularly with the concerns of the students in mind and assists students to understand the expectations of not only the Sports Department, but the school.

Please feel free to read the attached relevant information in regards to our Code of Conduct. I hope you enjoy the weekend off from school sport this weekend.

Expectations

Players

- 1. Play may be hard and vigorous but deliberate violence should never be used towards opponents.
- 2. Verbal provocation of any type is unacceptable.
- 3. Players should not react with violence to any physical or verbal provocation.
- 4. Use of bad language, whether directed at an umpire/referee, another player or oneself, is unacceptable.
- 5. Players should never argue with an umpire/referee (whether junior or adult) or contest a decision. Any negative response towards an umpire's ruling is unacceptable.
- 6. Only the captain can approach the referee/umpire to clarify a ruling in the event of uncertainty.
- 7. Immodest behaviour in victory or success, and manifestation of self disgust at an error or failure represent poor sportsmanship. Gracious conduct, whatever the result of a game, is important.
- 8. Unfair or illegal tactics to gain an advantage should never be used.
- 9. Excessive or inappropriate talk should not be used on the field of play

Spectators

- 1. Parents are asked to make their presence and support as positive as possible.
- 2. As the host School, parents are asked to assume some responsibility for making visiting parents feel at home.
- 3. When visiting another school or venue the host's premises and rules in matters of parking, tidiness etc. should be respected.
- 4. Parents should never seek, during or immediately after a game, to give advice to coaches, umpires/referees or to players.
- 5. Barracking may be enthusiastic, should be positive rather than negative, and avoid excessive attention to an individual. A good example should be set by applauding skilful performance and play regardless of the school/opposition.
- 6. Parents can assist their child's fuller education by being sensible regarding the number and length of their sporting commitments.

Non Sporting Activities 2016

New England Girls' School organises many activities such as debating, mock trial, orchestra, choir during the course of a year. Students participating in these activities take part in practice and in competitions.

The Association of Heads of Independent Girls' Schools NSW (AHIGS) administers and convenes inter - school activities (such as Archdale Debating and Festival of Speech) in which many students, including students of this school, participate.

While New England Girls' School and AHIGS take measures to make the activities as safe as reasonably possible for participants, there is a risk that students can be injured and suffer loss (including financial loss) and damage as a result of their participation in these activities, whether at practice or in actual events.

Such injury can occur while the student is engaging in or watching a non-sporting activity, or travelling to and from the event. The injury may result from a student's actions, the actions of others, the state of the premises or equipment failure (e.g. a collapsed stage during a debating competition).

On some occasions, an injury can be serious (such as torn ligaments, dislocations, back injuries, concussion or broken bones). In very rare cases an injury can be life threatening or result in permanent disability.

Students could also suffer loss as a result of their personal property being lost, stolen, damaged or destroyed.

Sporting Activities 2016

New England Girls' School organises many individual and team sporting activities during the course of a year. Some of these are organised in conjunction with the Association of Heads of Independent Girls' Schools NSW (AHIGS) and some with the Independent Primary School Heads' Association of Australia NSW (IPSHA). Students participating in these sporting activities take part in practice and in competitions.

New England Girls' School, AHIGS and IPSHA expect students to take responsibility for their own safety by wearing compulsory safety equipment, by thinking carefully about the use of safety equipment that is highly recommended and by behaving in a safe and responsible manner towards team members, opponents, spectators, officials, property and grounds.

While New England Girls' School, AHIGS and IPSHA take measures to make the sporting activities as safe as reasonably possible for participants, there is a risk that students can be injured and suffer loss (including financial loss) and damage as a result of their participation in these sporting activities, whether at training or in actual events.

Such injury can occur while the student is engaging in or watching a sporting activity, or travelling to and from the event. The injury may result from a student's actions, the actions of others, the state of the premises or equipment failure.

On some occasions, an injury can be serious (such as torn ligaments, dislocations, back injuries, concussion or broken bones). In very rare cases an injury can be life threatening or result in permanent disability.
