The significance of storytelling

- Gutenberg invented the printing press around 1440.
- The first radio transmissions were in the early 1900s.
- The television became commercially available less than a century ago.
- The Internet is only legally old enough to have a drink!
- Facebook and Twitter are just out of nappies, and the next big marketing tool is still in the womb or possibly just a twinkle in its creator's eye.

When most people think about spreading a message, the tools they think of are print, radio, TV and the web. None of these, however, are ingrained in us as much as storytelling. We've been telling stories for thousands of years, but we don't have to go back that far to understand storytelling's powerful effect on our hearts and minds. Go back only as far as your childhood, when you begged your parents to read your favourite story—the one you already knew by heart—just one more time. Why did you do that? Why was it so important to hear that story?



In Deuteronomy 6:5-7, the writer says:

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up."

So why should we tell stories?

1. Stories produce experiences

Experiences leave lasting impressions. They go far deeper than facts, figures or features.

2. Stories reveal what makes your message unique

Chances are that if you have an innovative or unique offering, it's not going to be innovative and/or unique very long. Any amount of success will generate copycats. But what they can't copy is who you are. What's your origin story? Where did your brand come from, and how has that shaped your product or service? When your facts, figures and features are in line, your story can set you apart from the competition.

3. Stories are the emotional glue connecting you to others

It's stories that create a real connection. Facebook now dedicates an entire site to stories. Fans can post stories about their individual and collective experiences. Tumblr and Twitter have done something similar with Storyboard and @twitterstories, respectively.

4. Stories shape information into meaning

There's nothing more mind numbing than hearing or reading a bunch of facts and figures. And anyone can recite numbers to an audience. A true communicator will weave a story around the information to create enjoyment, understanding and meaning for the audience.

5. Stories pass on values

Stories are uniquely able to move people's hearts and minds, to turn presentations into coveted experiences that reflect the values and attitudes of a community.

6. Stories are more likely to be shared

When was the last time a friend of yours called you up to tell you the latest information they were interested in? We share stories every day. This has only been amplified by social media, through which we are able to share with the click of a button. When a story resonates—moving people emotionally—they retell it many times over, ultimately amplifying the message.

7. Stories pass on accumulated wisdom

Storytelling is a crucial component to effective public speaking. It creates relevance for the audience, providing additional detail and mental visuals that bring to life otherwise dull, remote, or complex topics. Stories give speakers the opportunity to tell personal stories that relate to the audiences' experiences, thought processes, or values. Moreover, including stories in both interpersonal communication and public speaking helps your audience remember your statements or speech for later recall.

What stories do you enjoy? Pass them on to others. Most of all, encourage your children to read, to read widely and to give them the experience to be exposed to the wonderful world of words and stories – there are many benefits that result from them.

Please be aware that all the activities that mention "help" are designed for any student who wants to clarify Maths/Science concepts, need help with homework, are behind in learning (for some reason) or they just want to sit and do their homework with the chance of having immediate help if needed. In Mathematics we encourage peer tutoring, when girls in years 10, 11 and 12 will offer to be tutors and will earn community service hours. We even encourage the year 9 girls, who would like to help the year 7 or 8 ones, to become tutors. The tutors' diaries will be signed off for community service hours by the teacher on duty.

Parents, please encourage your daughter to take this opportunity and enjoy FREE Maths/ Science tutoring.

Girls, if you think you need that extra help, please come to the above rooms at the right time and enjoy this opportunity. Those who are able to help, please give your name to your Maths teacher and come at the right time and the right room.

- *Students must all be from the same school. (Small schools under 30 can have combined teams, contact Coordinator for more information)
- *Teams do not need to be allocated prior to the heat.
- *Substitutions are not permissible after the heat. (Team that takes part in heat must be the same as the team that takes part in the final.)
- *The heats and final are run by the Ouizmaster.

Students are invited to enter the inaugural NEGS & St John's Inter-house Triathlon Cup to be held on **Saturday 13th the of February (Week 3)**.

SUB JUNIOR (100m swim, 6km cycle, 1km run)

Teams will consist of three competitors (swim, cycle and run legs) from Years 3-6 in St John's from the same houses (Lyon, Murray, Green and Dumolo) and one parent/adult who will be the transition official for the team.

JUNIOR (200m swim, 10km cycle, 2km run)

Teams will consist of four competitors from Years 7-9 (swim, cycle, run and official) at NEGS from the same houses (Lyon, Murray, Green and Dumolo). Points accumulated on the day will be added to the House Cup at the conclusion of the year.

SENIOR (200m swim, 10km cycle, 2km run)

Teams will consist of four competitors from Years 10-12 (swim, cycle, run and official) at NEGS from the same houses (Lyon, Murray, Green and Dumolo). Points accumulated on the day will be added to the House Cup at the conclusion of the year.

INDIVIDUAL

One competitor from the above categories (Sub Junior, Junior, Senior) from St John's or NEGS will complete the same course as above but will do so on their own. They will race at the same time, but will be ranked as individual's rather then teams. Points accumulated on the day will be added to the House Cup at the conclusion of the year.

OFFICIALS

Students wishing to work for community service hours who are not a part of a team, can apply to be an official for the day to assist with the running of the event. Hours accumulated will be signed by the Sports Department.

RULES AND CONDITIONS

• No flippers, paddles or flotation devices will be allowed.


<u>Cycle</u>

• All cyclists must provide their own bike (please bring a BMX or trail bike as road bikes with narrow wheels will find the course unsuitable) and an approved helmet must be worn.

Run

- Runners must run on the side of the road as directed by race officials.
- Each Junior and Senior Team must supply an additional race official from their house to assist along the course. No team will be accepted without one.
- Each Sub Junior Team must have an accompanying parent/adult who will be utilised in the transition area during the sub junior race.
