From the Principal

IS IT WEEK 6 ALREADY?

IGSSA games/athletics are completed for another year; City-2-Surf has been run; Equestrian exchanges are nearly finalised and, most importantly, the HSC Trials are complete. Whilst this term has been busy thus far this busyness is not over as we still have the Father's Day Breakfast this Friday; the NEGS Polocrosse Carnival to be held in Guyra on the 8th & 9th September; Grandparent's Day 14th September; Musical performances 14th & 15th September, Old Girls' Weekend 14th - 16th September; and our Yr 12 Valedictory Celebrations in Week 10. Schools never stop.

What this does indicate is the fact that Schools need to be resilient, robust communities because of the challenging nature of educating young people. As a community, schools need to be able to withstand pressures, disappointments and hardships that are experienced by individuals, small groups and, in some cases, the school community. Equally, schools need to be caring and nurturing communities that enable individuals, groups and the whole school to support each other during such times.

As our Yr 12 students are reaching the end of their school journey, it is well worth remembering that the research and data are conclusive about the importance of the partnership between parents and schools in the academic attainment of students. John Hattie in his book Visible Learning states that "across all variables, parental aspirations and expectations for children's academic achievement has the strongest relationship with achievement... Thus parents need to hold high aspirations and expectations for their children and schools need to work in partnership with children and their parents".

Another author providing some sound advice to us all is Fabian Mandini. In times where students are trying to fit everything in, and often forgo sleep in doing so, we should not discourage our girls from studying or participating in co-curricular activities. However, we should be asking the following:

Does it take 45 minutes to start homework in the evening? Do you pack up early at the end of a period?

What plans do you have in place if your homework is completed early? What do you do during study periods (if you have any) during the day? What happens during afternoons when you have no commitments? Do you have a weekly timetable?

It's not news that sleep is tied to learning - even a 90-minute nap can significantly help boost your brain power - but if our girls want to cement new knowledge in their brain, recent sleep research demonstrates that a good night's sleep shortly following your studies has a significant impact on your ability to retain information. A lesson from which we can all learn.

The Good Parent When your child lies to you.

This is one of the more difficult problems that parents are faced with as their child is growing. Around the age of three, children develop the "theory of mind", in which they discover that not only do they have their own mind, but so too $\,$ do other people. They gradually realise that they can know things that you do not, and because of this they discover that they can lie to avoid the shame of another's judgment; "I know something you don't know".

Lying well and appropriately is thus a very important developmental task. We all lie everyday. We all have thoughts that we do not share with those around us, and lying can variously be a very appropriate response, or can be immoral, depending on the circumstances. The only way to develop the skill of lying appropriately is to actually lie and then experience the outcome of the lie. The shopkeeper's saying "take what you want and pay for it" applies here. "Of course you can lie, and you will pay the price of lying".

It is for this reason we don't want to shame our children excessively when they lie. Expecting them not to never lie is ridiculous, as how will they work out how to lie well if they never get to lie. But, we also want them to learn from the lie and experience the logical outcome of avoiding the truth so they can grow into healthy and moral young people.

So if your child lies, the 4C approach can be quite helpful.

- Be cool: its ok, children lie, it's not personal. Sure, they may be in trouble, but this is just the business of being in your family, that generally we value truth over lying, and lying leads to a cost that needs to be paid.
- Calm the reptile: when a child lies to you, it is very provocative, and you and they can really flip your lid about it. If you or they have flipped, don't try to address the problem. Take a time out, calm down, and then come together later to try to work it out (past posts look at this).
- Connect with the mammal: "I don't care what you think until I think that you care". Together we will work it out.
- Converse with the human: Previous posts look at this in some detail. I am now going to suggest one idea around how to address your child if you think they have lied. Note, this will not work if you are not cool, calm and connected to your child.

Child: but I didn't take the biscuit

Adult: I hear you, and it sounds like you are annoyed that I have questioned you about it. Help me understand what you think happened to the biscuit.

well, I don't know, but it wasn't me.

Adult: ok. Have you got any other thoughts about what happened?

Child:

do you want to know my thoughts about the missing biscuit? Adult:

Child: you think I took it!

Adult: do you want to know what my thoughts are about the missing biscuit?

(broken record)

Child: alright.

Adult: well, I may be wrong, and if I am I'm really sorry (one down position).

But I've developed the belief that you took the biscuit.

Child: I didn't!

Adult: and if I am wrong I am so sorry. But the biscuit was there, you were the only one home, and on return from being out the biscuit was gone and there were biscuit crumbs in your room. That's why I believe you took it, and I'm going to have to act on that belief.

Child: you never believe me

Adult: that must feel really awful (validation). And again I apologise if I got this wrong. But I don't believe I am wrong. And so I am going to act accordingly.

Child: I hate you

Adult: I'm sorry I've made you so upset. When you are ready, lets talk about

how we can fix this.

Note, I have not said "You lied", as that will likely get into a combative arguing interaction where they said "no I didn't" and you say "yes you did" and it goes round and around. Rather I said, "I've developed the belief you lied". This is unarguable, as it is absolutely true you developed the belief they lied. You are aware you may be wrong, but it can't be argued that you don't believe it. And as a good parent, you will act on the belief you have developed. It is a subtle difference, but try it out and you may realise that it makes a very big difference in whether you get drawn into their combat or not.

We want our kids to lie; we just want them to learn how to do it morally and wisely, just as we had to learn how to do it. A parent who gently but firmly confronts their child with their lie can help the child to own the lie, and learn how to repair it.

Careers News

THIS IS AN EXTREMELY BUSY TIME OF THE YEAR

In the careers department and there is a wealth of information to impart to you all. Therefore I am going to break this newsletter into two sections, the first for Yr 12 students and parents and caregivers, and the remainder of the information is applicable to all.

Year 12

Year 12 have completed their trials by the time they are reading this and now it is time to think about all the various things that need to be done on the careers front.

Who can answer the question? What is the difference between a career and a job? Think about this carefully and you will find the answer at the bottom of this newsletter. Do you realise that unless you have been proactively looking at different course options for a number of years, you are suddenly being asked to choose from more than 2,000 courses at Universities and potentially more than 1,200 courses at TAFE if you choose this way of studying.

Here are some important dates for you to acknowledge. More are available on the <u>NEGS Careers Portal</u> which you should be accessing regularly by now. Google have now added a search feature which allows you to search on keywords too! I add new information weekly so please keep informed. I am always available for a chat or a more in-depth discussion if required.

UAC APPLICATIONS; Apply online.

If you apply before 28 September, you pay \$70 as opposed to \$200 if you apply after. If you apply before 28 September, you are also able to apply for Student Recommendation Schemes (SRS or Early Entry) which are available through some universities. You must enrol with UAC before you can apply for SRS for some universities.

UNE Early Entry is available until 28 September and you will get an offer sometime in November. Sometimes they will offer you a pathways program first if your Yr 12 & Yr 11 reports indicate that this would be beneficial for

Southern Cross University early entry closes **14 September** and this is a hard and fast date. There are 3 levels of STAR Entry to apply for. STAR Platinum requires Principal support but the others do not. Not all courses are available through STAR Platinum so read carefully and come and see me if you require assistance. **Applications are made online**. NSW students are advised of the outcome on **12 November**.

BOND University entry is direct to BOND unless you are undertaking medical studies. You will find their ATARs are less onerous than other universities and they have a much more practical focus on their courses. I am undertaking a visit there in the next few weeks and therefore can give you more information on my return.

The University of the Sunshine Coast is the only QLD uni that offers early entry. More information available on the careers portal.

Remember you can apply to UAC, QTAc, VTAC and other state equivalents. This gives you more choices and options.

Don't disregard applying for Diploma Courses as well. Many Unis are now offering Diplomas that give you direct entry into a degree with the subjects studied given credit. The advantage of this is that you can often get work when you have a Diploma and then continue studying either full or part time. Please see me if you would like to discuss this further.

There are many scholarships available. Some of these have deadlines so please look into the ones available at your chosen institutions. I have loaded a guide to students who are applying for a scholarship on the portal.

Anyone interested in a career in medicine there is a 5 day Rural Scholars Summer School being held in November at UNE. It is totally free. More information on the careers portal or see me.

I am intending to hold a RSG/RSA course the weekend of the 10/11 November. Please let me know ASAP if you are interested in attending. I will then be able to work out the costs etc. when I know numbers. Please let me know by 7 September.

Years 7 - 11

Do you think you are too young to be thinking about careers and your choices when you leave school? Research is confirming that the more you think about this and investigate options from a younger age, the more informed your choice will be when you leave school.

Think about this. Are you performing an elite sport or aiming to perform at an elite level? Well to do this, you don't get there by one day thinking I am going to represent my country when I get out of bed in the morning, do you? You need to practice and dedicate yourself to this. So then think about this. All of a sudden in Yr 12 you are being asked to make a career choice. There are currently more than 2,000 courses available at Australian Universities and more than 1,200 courses in NSW TAFE on offer. Which one will you choose? Do you have the required prerequisites? All of this information is available to you so you can do your research at any age. This in no means says that you must decide on your career path in Yr 7. What it is asking you do is that you start exploring your interests early.

Parents/caregivers do you realise that you are singularly the most influential person on your child's career thinking and progression? Therefore you have a role in your child's development. All parents and students have access to our NEGS Careers Portal. On the portal is instructions and a link to a website called JobJump. When you have an opportunity please explore the site and go through the quizzes with your children. They can do this as many times as they like and then options will be presented that will give them some different career options that they and you may never have thought of. Relevant courses of study and prerequisites are listed as well as often there are interviews with people that have chosen this career path. For any more information please contact me.

For anyone over the age of 15 interested in a career in medicine, there is a 5 day summer school at UNE in November with all expenses paid. More information is on the careers portal (which does have a search function now).

Year 10 students should all be thinking about their work experience week in week 8 of Term 4. You should all have received an email with this information but everything is available on the Careers Portal as well. To date I am yet to receive any paperwork from Yr 10 students. The paperwork can be scanned and emailed to me at careers.advisor@negs.nsw.edu.au.

For any other students undertaking work experience (including Yr10 outside of Week 8) please access the information on the careers portal.

Volunteering and community service is seen as something of great value for your resume and scholarship applications. The NEGS Homework Centre is calling for student volunteers and this can be used on your resume if you can show a consistent commitment. The Homework Centre are particularly interested on having extra students on a Thursday afternoon. If this is something that interests you please see Mrs Bennett in the Homework Centre or make contact with myself.
