From the Principal

As the School term marches on, with commitments ever extending into our work-life-balance and on the back of Father's Day, I thought it was appropriate to include the latest study on the importance of a father's work-life balance as being crucial to his children's wellbeing. At the same time all students are encouraged to balance their commitments to ensure their best results academically and with a healthy mind. This is especially relevant for Yr 12 as the Higher School Certificate examinations are only a matter of weeks away. When Mrs Swartz and I spoke with Yr 12 girls last week, we also stressed the importance of finishing their final weeks at the School, well. To validate the point, is the unfortunate outburst of Serena Williams this week at the US Open. This act has served to leave a tarnish on an otherwise outstanding career. I implore the girls to think before they act and to finish strong.

Fathers' work-life balance is crucial to children's mental wellbeing

A study by researchers at the Australian National University (ANU) has found that a father's work-life balance is crucial to the mental health of his children. Researchers surveyed 2,496 Australian families, finding that it is not just a mother's struggle to balance work and home commitments that affects children, but also that experienced by fathers.

ANU researchers were able to demonstrate that the mental health of children deteriorates when their mother or father experiences an increase in work-family conflict. Conversely, children's mental health improves when work-family conflict is reduced. Another key finding is that men are equally as likely to experience a problem with work-life balance as women, with 16% of men saying they never or rarely feel work and family life is in balance, compared with 15% of women.

ANU researcher, Dr Liana Leach, recently interviewed about the study by Susie O'Brien for the Herald Sun newspaper, said that: Fathers say they can't even get to things like family

events. Even when they are spending time with family they say they can't enjoy it because they're always thinking about work. Furthermore, says Dr Leach, the study shows that work-life conflict leads to "fatigue, distress or emotional withdrawal as parents forgo family events or valued time with their children for work-related opportunities and expectations". In turn, when work-family conflict becomes chronic, "children's wellbeing is adversely affected both directly and indirectly via increases in poor parent mental health, parenting irritability and marital dissatisfaction".

According to the ANU study, published in the Social Science and Medicine journal, fathers want to spend more time with their children but say that their work does not allow them to. This is backed up by Australian census data showing that about 90% of men are employed and 92% of those are employed full-time. "The problem is compounded," Dr Leach told the Herald Sun, "for fathers who want to be with their families more but end up working 40 to 60 hours a week."

Data from the Australian Bureau of Statistics shows that the number of couples with children where both parents work full-time or part-time increased from 59% a decade ago to 64% in June 2017. This has principally occurred as a result

of the increasing number of women joining the paid workforce, now at a record high of 60%. Couple families with one parent working full-time and one working part-time are the most common group, comprising 35% of couple families with children in June 2017. The biggest increase, however, has been among couple families with both parents working full-time, up from 21% ten years ago to 25% in June 2017.

Dr Jennifer Baxter of the Australian Institute of Family Studies estimates that 31% of two-parent Australian families have a stay-at-home mother, while 4% have a stay-at-home father (up from about 2% in 1981) — though it should be noted that is difficult to estimate the number of stay-at-home fathers as some may be temporarily unemployed or studying rather than genuinely choosing to be a stay-at-home parent while their partner is the principal wage earner.

The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) estimates that the number of fathers using flexible work hours to look after children aged under 12 has doubled in the past twenty years, up from 16% of fathers in the mid-1990s to about 30% in 2016. In addition, the number of fathers working from home to care for their children has doubled from 7% to 14%, and the number of fathers working part-time to help care for their children has risen from 1% to 5%.

However, as the ABS notes, 90% of fathers with children aged under 15 are employed and 92% of these work full-time. By comparison, 65% of mothers with children aged under 15 are employed and 42% of these work full-time. Fathers working full-time work an average of 42 hours per week while mothers working full-time average 33 hours per week.

In addition, parents must factor in hours of housework; childcare; household administration; home maintenance; attending children's sporting, music and other commitments; caring for elderly and other relatives; and other family and work obligations on evenings and weekends — leaving little time for family time, socialising, exercise or relaxation.

Lisa Connolly, Director of Family and Community Statistics at the ABS, says that it comes as no surprise that about 93% of mothers and 85% of fathers with children aged under 15 feel "rushed or pressed for time". However, she also notes that 89% of parents still feel that they spend "quality time with family and friends".

Nevertheless, with the ANU study finding that children's wellbeing is adversely affected when the conflict between their parents' work and family life becomes chronic — resulting in "poor parent mental health, parenting irritability and marital dissatisfaction" — perhaps it is time for increasingly busy families to draw breath and consider the role that all family members, including fathers, play in creating a better work-life balance and improved mental wellbeing for both parents and children.

Careers @ NEGS

I am writing this on my way back from the Gold Coast where I was fortunate enough to be able to visit the fantastic Bond University campus at Robina. To say I was impressed would be an understatement. These are a few dot points on what impressed me and what you may not be aware of. Now where to start!

- Bond is a private university and therefore you pay fees. However you are eligible for FEE help which means that you can put all of your undergraduate degree on FEE help and then pay it back, similar to HECS. Your debt levels are not very different to what it would be if you were adding it to HECS. For many of the degrees you do not need to pay for additional resources e.g. materials, textbooks.
- Bond has very small class sizes, mostly a maximum of 24.
- Students at Bond are immersed in real life situations from the first day. For example if you are an architecture student you are working on real plans from day 1 with students from 2nd, 3rd and 4th year supervised by real architects.
- From Day 1 students have to undertake Beyond Bond, where the students work towards gaining a job at the completion of their studies.

 Students have access to the transformer program free of charge. The transformer program allows students to explore their entrepreneurial ideas and see them come to fruition in a supportive environment.



- Bond have the trimester program which runs over a calendar year unlike other universities where the third trimester runs over the Christmas Break.
- Bond's campus is situated on the river and is a stunning setting with many sculptures and places to relax or have a break outside. We found it hard to believe

MAKE CAR TIME COUNT

Parents spend a lot of time behind the steering wheel driving their children to school and other activities, here is some good news. Time spent in the car with children is the perfect opportunity to have quality conversations with them.

The car is the perfect place to start a conversation. Often in the car there is no pressure so often you will have the most significant conversations of the day with your children at that time...you can catch up on what is happening in their world – at school, their friends, things that they have coming up, and perhaps things they are worried about, and are excited about. It is a much more relaxed environment to tackle issues or offer advice and also it is a nice time to spend with them. It can be fun and silly and you can have that connection with them.

Clinical Psychologist Kirrilie Smout of Developing Minds Psychology and Education says, "the car can be the perfect place for conversations because it removes home distractions for both parents and children". "Children are sometimes more likely to talk to parents in the car than when they are home." Many find the lack of intense eye contact, the lack of other activity options, and the brief nature of the trip make it easier for them to relax and talk. Parents and children can just chat and listen. When you are having conversations in the car, show genuine interest in your child's opinions, experiences and ideas. Share your ideas and experiences of work, friendships and life. Give your children an age-appropriate glimpse into what you think about issues.

- Our bus can definitely outdo a kangaroo: Bus 1 Kangaroo 0.












IPSHA Athletics Carnival
