From the Principal

As I pen my final newsletter for Term 1 from Lexington, Kentucky participating in the 2019 Equestrian Tour of the USA, I am privileged to be travelling with fourteen girls who embody the spirit of what it is to be a NEGS girl adventurous, engaged and young women of whom we can all be proud.

These girls are in turn privileged to be given this opportunity - by their parents and their School - because what the girls are experiencing - what they are seeing and the people they are meeting - transcends this excursion as being one about all things equestrian, because it is far from that. It is a journey that analyses the fundamentals of success - it is the "iceberg" philosophy that is: we all only ever see the end result of a person's success however it is the hard work, persistence, late nights,

rejections, sacrifices, discipline, criticism, doubts, failure and risks so omnipresent to the person involved, but so deep under the "water" that no one else can ever see the reality of how they got there in the first place. Regardless of background or opportunity, we can all learn from this because to achieve anything in life there are no short cuts - sacrifice in some shape or form, is what it takes.

A true believer in this philosophy is equestrian legend, Mr Bruce Davidson, whom we had the pleasure of meeting at his property in Orlando, Florida. At age 70, Bruce is still riding and we watched him school a young jumping horse, both on the flat and jumps. Bruce is legendary as the only equestrian to be immortalised in Kentucky at the infamous Kentucky Horse Park, host of Rolex Four Star Eventing.

The reason why is below:

"Bruce Davidson's individual Gold Medal in the 1974 World Three-Day Event Championships at Burghley, England gave the United States the right to host the next World Championships. The state of Kentucky bid for, and received, the right to produce the 1978 World Championships at the new Kentucky Horse Park. Organised by Equestrian Events Inc, the 1978 World Championships saw Davidson again capture the Individual World Champion title. Thus began a record-setting six times winning the Kentucky Three-Day Event.

Bruce was the US Eventing Association's Rider of the Year first in 1975 and then for 14 consecutive years, 1982-1995. He won the Individual Silver Medal in the 1975 Pan American Games as a member of the Silver medal Team and the Individual Gold Medal in the 1995 Pan Am Games.

A five-time Olympian, Davidson was a member of the 1972 Silver Medal Team, the 1976 and 1984 Gold Medal Teams, the 1988 Team and the 1996 Silver Medal Team. He represented the US in five World Championships and in addition to his two Individual Gold Medals in 1974 and 1978, won the Individual Silver Medal at the 1990 World Championships."

Bruce is simply the most accomplished event rider the world has ever seen and likely to see, and he was inspirational.



Another inspirational person much closer to home is our 2017 Dux and Senior Prefect Eliza White who has just been awarded the Queensland University of Technology Vice-Chancellor's Scholarship based on academic merit. Congratulations to Eliza on such an outstanding effort.

As we have now safely arrived in Washington DC after a 9 hour drive where snow was falling along the way, I wish you all a wonderful and restorative break and look forward to an exciting Term 2.

WITH WIDESPREAD ACCESS TO DIGITAL DEVICES, PART OF OUR ROLE AS EDUCATORS IS TO PROVIDE STUDENTS WITH GUIDELINES ABOUT ACCEPTABLE USE.

Our Acceptable Usage of Digital Devices Statement acknowledges that appropriate access to, and education about, ICT has the capacity to enhance students' learning experiences, and when selected by teachers for use in the classroom, it is intended to assist students to achieve learning outcomes.

Use of the internet and online communication services at NEGS is intended for research, learning and communication between students and staff. Access to the internet and online communication tools at school will assist students to develop the digital literacy skills necessary to use the internet effectively and appropriately.



As such, I draw your attention to point 13 in the Acceptable Usage of Digital Devices student agreement (on page 10 of the student diary) and our statement about adhering to age restrictions on websites and apps.

I need to be aware that social networking sites such as Facebook and Instagram are accessible to children over the age of 13. As educators, staff are obliged to report underage usage to the relevant organisation, regardless of parental consent. When the School is made aware of a breach to these conditions parents will be contacted then the School will submit an underage form to protect the student as it is regarded as a Child Protection matter. Any queries regarding age restrictions will be referred to the Office of the Children's Safety Commissioner (www.esafety.gov.au). The research is unequivocal, access to online content before students are of age is dangerous, risky and without doubt, challenging for parents.

This is particularly relevant to Netflix where their terms of service states:

4.1. You must be 18 years of age, or the age of majority in your province, territory or country, to become a member of the Netflix service. Minors may only use the service under the supervision of an adult.



Access to technology, including digital devices and the internet, comes with responsibility to use it in an acceptable manner. A breach of this agreement will incur consequences.

We will continue to provide students with best practice information about safe, healthy and appropriate use of digital devices through our partnership with Safe on Social.



> I will leave you with some ideas from the Parenting Ideas blog about having conversations with your children about the recent Christchurch incident.



What do you say to a young child who wants an explanation about what has just happened in Christchurch? How do you respond to a primary school child trying to come to terms with the fact that one person could commit this offence? There are no easy answers to these questions, but be assured that your child will benefit from talking to you. These ideas may help:

Be available: Let your child know that it is okay to talk about the events in Christchurch. Listen to what they think and feel. By listening, you can find out if they have misunderstandings, and you can learn more about the support that they need. You do not need to explain more than they are ready to hear, but be willing to answer their questions.

Filter the news: While we don't advocate censorship, we do suggest that you take particular care about your child's exposure to news events. The consistency of images can be frightening for young children who don't understand the notion of distance and have difficulty distinguishing between reality and fiction. Older children and teenagers will probably be interested in news events, but they probably need an adult available to answer their questions and reassure them.

Moderate your language: Currently, we live in very divisive times. The fact that this shooting was carried out on one particular group demonstrates just the extent of the divisiveness of our community. Encourage children to be inclusive, steering clear of valued-laden, extreme language such as 'terrorists', 'evil' and 'horrors' when describing the events and the alleged perpetrators. Not only does this type of language encourage children and young people to take a position rather than focus on the problems, it risks desensitising them to the reality of the impact of this event. The use of more sedate, yet descriptive language such as 'gunman', 'awful' and 'tragedy' can remove the emotional sting, while demonstrating the enormity of the event's impact.

Show them how to change the world: Arguably, these are the worst of times in terms of social divisiveness. Our children in many ways are letting us know that they don't want to continue living this way. So how can they have an impact? Recently a timely clue came my way in the form of a notification from Facebook. Over the weekend, a parent shared an existing message to her Muslim friends as a message of hope.

The quote reads: "Don't become too pre-occupied with your child's academic ability, but instead teach them to sit with those sitting alone. Teach them to be kind. Teach them to offer help. Teach them to be a friend to the lonely. Teach them to encourage others. Teach them to think about other people. Teach them to share. Teach them to look for the good. This is how they will change the world."

We get that power back when we start to impact the people around us in small ways, making positive changes for the better. 'Kindness', 'helping others', 'encouraging', 'sharing' and similar concepts don't make great political slogans but they form the basis of every strong community- which is precisely what children need.

Christine Porter visit to NEGS

Her work is a "visual exploration of the beauty and diversity of the iconic, Australian shearing shed" (NERAM website). The exhibition depicts an historical narrative, portraying an industry vital still to the New England, as well as presenting new work from the artist. Using watercolour as one of her preferred mediums, "Deeargee", Uralla is the hundredth shed she has painted. Interestingly enough, the hundredth shed is linked to Sophie Sutherland who is currently completing her HSC in Visual Arts.



Christine was kind enough to speak with students from Years 5 & 6 and Visual Arts students from Years 7- 12 in two separate sittings. She discussed her inspiration and the process she goes through to create the work that she does. We were also privileged enough to receive a demonstration on how she works with watercolours to get an insight into her technique and the tools that she uses. There was a real fascination involved in watching an artist work. Teachers and students alike were awed by her talent and ease with the material. The detail she is able to achieve in her works show her dedication to painting and a real passion for the places and things she documents in her art practice.

A huge thank you goes out to Christine for speaking with the students and for donating her time to give us all insight into her world. It was such a wonderful opportunity for students to see her work first hand and ask an experienced artist questions about her practice.





I have been discussing with Year 12, the importance of finding the right course for them, which means that they should not be focused on a particular university in a particular location, rather they should find the course that best suits them and then find the university or pathway to be able to access this course. I have also been stressing the importance of applying for scholarships. Scholarships provide at least a twofold benefit. One is the obvious, financial aid, but the second is that it looks really good on your resume and as they are merit based, gives you an advantage in the very competitive job market when you graduate.

Year 12 have been undertaking a more formalised careers program this term and this will continue for the first couple of weeks of Term 2. The remainder of Term 2 will see Year 11 undertake the program, followed by Year 10 in Term 3 and Year 9 in Term 4.

Year 7 has had their first careers lesson and they will continue with these through the year. Year 8 will have their first careers lesson in Week 11. Each year the careers program will build on the skills learnt the year/s before.

Year 12 have also been looking at goal setting and the value in creating their own Personal Education Plan. Please discuss these with your daughters.


