From the Principal

Welcome to a busy Term 2 and an especially warm welcome to all our new families. The word is spreading about our wonderful school and the increasing number of students who are present on the day is a continuing and pleasing trend in recent times.

Each school term presents a changing landscape for all of us to successfully navigate together. There is a continuously busy schedule of school work and cocurricular commitments to negotiate this term, which is a condensed one with a public holiday combined

with significant school events such as Junior School Open Day; Scholarship Day; Talented Athlete Program Trials; Athletics Carnival; Mother's Day Morning Tea; Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 NAPLAN testing; Coona Horse Expo; Wingham Beef Week - all of these things can interrupt our students from establishing their regular routines and, in some instances, their schoolwork focus can be temporarily lost. I have attached for your interest the latest research by Professor Jean Twenge's linking girls' use of digital media to increases in depression and serious psychological distress.

Girls' use of digital media linked to depression and serious psychological distress

The release of a new study by renowned Professor of Psychology at San Diego State University, Jean Twenge, has confirmed her earlier research findings that rates of serious psychological distress and major depression have risen significantly in American teens and young adults between 2005 and 2017.

Twenge and her colleagues used data from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health, a nationally representative survey of over 600,000 American adolescents and adults. Overall, they found that adolescents and young adults experienced higher rates of serious psychological distress, depression and suicide in the late 2010s than in the 2000s. As these trends are "weak or non-existent" in adults aged 26 and over, this suggests "a generational shift in mood disorders and suicide-related outcomes rather than an overall increase across all ages".

From 2005 to 2017, average rates of a major depressive episode in the past year increased from 8.7% to 13.2% in teens aged 12-17 and from 8.1% to 13.2% in young adults aged 18-25. Rates, however, were much higher in girls than boys. In girls aged 12-17 the rate increased from 13.1% to 19.9% (one in five). Nearly all of these increases occurred after 2010.

THE LARGEST INCREASE IN SERIOUS PSYCHOLOGICAL DISTRESS OCCURRED IN YOUNG ADULTS AGED 20-21, THOUGH THE 18-25 YEAR OLD GROUP ALSO RECORDED A SIGNIFICANT INCREASE. THE HIGHEST RATE OCCURRED IN YOUNG PEOPLE BORN IN 1999, OF WHOM 8.2% REPORTED SUFFERING SERIOUS PSYCHOLOGICAL DISTRESS IN THE PAST MONTH.

Suicide-related outcomes (suicidal ideation, plans, attempts, and deaths by suicide) in the past year also increased in young adults aged 18-25. As Twenge and her colleagues note, however, the low base rate "suggests that these results should be interpreted with caution". For example, twice as many in the iGen cohort born in 1999 reported thinking about suicide compared with the Millennial cohort born in 1982 (7.8% vs. 3.8%), while 2.9% of the iGen cohort and 1.0% of Millennials reported having made a suicide plan.

For age groups ranging from 18-19 up to 65+, the rate of deaths by suicide increased between 2008 and 2017 with the highest increase of 56% occurring among young adults aged 18-19. Significant increases of over 30% were also seen in adults aged in their 20s and early 30s. In real terms, this translates into the suicide rate for 18- to 19-year-olds increasing from 9.33 per 100,000 (0.00009%) in 2008 to 14.53 per 100,000 (0.00015%) in 2017. While these figures may appear low, according to the Australian Bureau of Statistics, suicide was the leading cause of death in 2017 for Australians aged between 15 and 44.

Twenge and her colleagues were also interested in the effect of factors including sex, race/ethnicity and income levels on the mood order indicators of psychological distress, major depressive episodes and suicide outcomes. Their results indicate that the increase in adolescent major depressive episodes was larger for girls than boys, while the increase in serious psychological distress, major depressive episodes and suicidal thoughts, suicidal plans and suicide attempts were all larger in women than men.

It was also found that increases in mood disorder indicators were generally larger among White Americans than Black Americans, Hispanic Americans and Asian Americans, and that larger increases occurred among individuals with the highest total family income. Twenge and her colleagues write that:

This suggests the largest increases in mood disorder outcomes occurred among higher socioeconomic status White women and girls.

Overall, a rise was found in mood disorder indicators and suiciderelated outcomes between those born in the 1980s and those born in the 1990s (late Millennials and early iGen). As past major depressive episodes (MDE) are a strong predictor of an increased risk of MDE recurrence, the generation born in the 1990s may be more likely to experience mood disorders throughout their lives. This is concerning given that earlier onset of mood disorders predicts increased odds of chronicity (that is, a condition becoming chronic), recurrence, psychiatric and medical hospitalisations, impaired functioning, suicide attempts, and death by suicide.

TWENGE AND HER COLLEAGUES WRITE THAT WHILE THE CAUSE OF THE REPORTED TRENDS IS UNKNOWN, THEY CAN STATE THAT IT IS NOT RELATED TO CYCLICAL ECONOMIC FACTORS. THIS IS BECAUSE THE INCREASE IN MOOD DISORDER FACTORS OCCURRED DURING A PERIOD AFTER 2011 WHEN THE US ECONOMY WAS EXPANDING AND UNEMPLOYMENT WAS FALLING. SUBSTANCE ABUSE IS ALSO NOT LIKELY TO BE A CAUSE AS STUDIES SHOW THAT DRUG AND ALCOHOL USE BY ADOLESCENTS AND YOUNG ADULTS IS STABLE OR FALLING. SO WHAT IS THE CAUSE OF THE REPORTED TRENDS? POSSIBILITIES THAT CANNOT BE RULED OUT INCLUDE:

Increased reporting of mental health issues: Younger cohorts may be more willing to admit to mental health issues. There may also be more accurate reporting of death by suicide by coroners and medical examiners; increased reporting of non-suicidal self-injury by hospital staff; and increased hospitalisation of adolescents for suicidal ideation and attempts.

Increased use of electronic communication and digital media: Previous studies show that individuals who spend more time on social media report lower wellbeing and are more likely to be depressed, while general internet use and involvement in cyberbullying (as victim or perpetrator) are linked to depression, self-harm, and suicidal thoughts and behaviours. Jean Twenge also notes in her contribution to the World Happiness Report 2019 that studies show that internet and social media users may feel that "their lives are inferior compared with the glamourous 'highlight reels' of other's social media pages", while those who limit or cease digital media use improve their wellbeing.

Sleep: Sleep duration in American adolescents and young people is declining, with one study finding an insomnia rate of 18.5% in university students compared with 7.4% in the general population. Previous studies have also found that compromised sleep is a major risk factor in the onset, recurrence, chronicity, and severity of major depressive episodes, and that sleep disturbances are linked to suicidal ideation, suicide attempts, and death by suicide. In addition, recent studies have linked time spent on electronic devices with shorter sleep duration and poorer quality of sleep, while other studies have found that problematic internet and social media use are linked to sleep disturbances and depressive symptoms.

In the *World Happiness Report 2019*, Jean Twenge concludes that the large amount of time adolescents spend on digital devices is either directly linked to unhappiness and/or that it displaces time spent on activities proven to increase happiness, including sleep, sport and exercise, face-to-face social interaction, volunteer work, going to the movies, keeping up with news and current affairs, and attending religious services. In fact, the Monitoring the Future survey for 2013-2016 found that all activities correlated with general happiness in American 8th and 10th graders are non-phone activities, while all activities carried out on phones, including listening to music, using the internet, computer games, social media, texting, video chats and phone calls were negatively correlated with happiness. With one recent study finding that girls spending five or more hours a day on social media are three time more likely to be depressed than non-users, it seems more important than ever to switch off, reconnect and rediscover genuine happiness.




NSW INTERSCHOOL STATE TEAM








NEGS Library News Miss Laura Cambridge

Aussie Hoops skills for Kinder – Yr 2 recommences on Sunday 5th May from 10 – 11am in 'The Den' at Armidale High School:


