THAT "SMALL STEP" WAS THE CULMINATION OF MANY YEARS OF HARD WORK, PROBLEM SOLVING, RISK TAKING AND DEDICATION BY A HUGE NUMBER OF INDIVIDUALS WORKING TOGETHER FOR ONE GOAL.

It was initiated almost ten years earlier when on September 12, 1962 the President of the United States, John F Kennedy, made a speech persuading Americans to support the Apollo space program, that would ultimately succeed in putting humans on the moon.

So why did we go?

It is a similar question to what many teachers hear regularly. "Why do we have to learn this?" or "When am I ever going to use this?".

Why go to the moon? What did it achieve?

Human advancement has come not from doing what we can already do but by trying to do those things which we can not. Solving unfamiliar problems. Education; why we are here, is based around teaching students how to do things that they can not yet do.

ULTIMATELY IT EQUIPS INDIVIDUALS TO BE ABLE TO SOLVE PROBLEMS FOR THEMSELVES, EVEN WHEN THEY MAY NOT HAVE EXPERIENCED THEM BEFORE.

In space exploration, time and again, scientists had to solve problems that had never been solved before. New equipment was designed and developed in response to new challenges encountered. Space exploration has consequently contributed to many diverse aspects of life, from solar panels to implantable heart monitors, from cancer therapy to light- weight materials, from water-purification systems to improved computing systems and from artificial limbs to a global search-and-rescue system. In fact many advancements are evident even in our everyday lives. Camera phones, sport shoes, first aid safety blankets, cordless vacuum cleaners, ear thermometers, home insulation, jaws of life, wireless headsets, smoke detectors and even baby formula are but a few regular items whose invention or significant development can also be traced to the space program.

Space scientists and engineers who overcame past challenges could not have predicted all the ways in which their innovations are now being used on Earth.

These are examples where people used their knowledge, their education, in new and innovative ways, solving new and unique problems and challenges without knowing where there efforts would ultimately lead.

In fact the 'space race' as it was known in the 1950's and 60's did not only reap technological benefits but also social advancement.

Some of you may have seen the movie *Hidden Figures*. This movie documents, albeit in a Hollywood style where some of the details are somewhat muddied for dramatic effect, the story of three African American women working at NASA. These women were paid less and had less opportunity for advancement than their male or white female colleagues and were initially subject to segregation in the workplace, despite displaying exceptional intellectual abilities. However, for NASA to get astronauts into space and home safely, institutions that supported prejudices and biases needed to start changing. All hands and brains had to be utilised. Hidden Figures highlights NASA's relatively progressive attitude for the time, driven in large part by necessity. The previous time such advancement had occurred for women, in particular, was during the second world war, so certainly space exploration provided a far more positive vehicle for such change. Recognition of all individuals as being equally capable of providing valuable contributions to a common goal was a significant advancement for the far more equitable society we live in today.

THESE WOMEN EPITOMISED NOT ONLY ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT BUT ALSO CONSISTENT EFFORT AS THEY MADE THE MOST OF THEIR EDUCATION AND INDEED FOUGHT FOR FURTHER OPPORTUNITIES TO ADVANCE THEIR KNOWLEDGE, BE IT IN ENGINEERING, MATHEMATICS OR COMPUTING.

Quoting from the paper 'Benefits Stemming from Space Exploration' written by the International Space Exploration Coordination Group:

"To a great extent, the benefits from space exploration are rooted in the generation of new knowledge, which is the first reward and which has inherent value to humankind. Technological knowledge, generated when high-performance space systems are developed to address the extreme challenges of space missions, yields many innovations that benefit the public. Scientific knowledge acquired from space expands humankind's understanding of nature and frequently unlocks creative and useful Earth-based applications for society."

So fifty years after landing on the moon, I believe we should celebrate the great human endeavour of that feat and recognise the academic achievement of those individuals involved in the process. Also we should recognise the resilience of all of those involved in order to overcome and problem solve all the obstacles encountered.

It is my hope that it may inspire some of you today to also 'shoot for the stars', in whatever field you choose. Once again I would like to congratulate all students who have earned their awards today.

We have welcomed 13 new students into boarding this term and although a little homesickness has been experienced I can confidently say they have all transitioned exceptionally well into life at NEGS. Well Done to the girls and their families. A trial buddy system was implemented this term for new students and a big congratulations to the students who upheld their responsibility in a serious manner to ensure the new students felt comfortable, safe and not lost in their first couple of weeks.





Mobile Device Use

At the end of Term 2 the boarding students were given the opportunity to have a voice in the never ending debates and discussions about mobile device use. Each year group were asked to put together a proposal of changes they would like to see in boarding, in regards to their mobile phones. There are an increasing number of students involved in early morning fitness programs, so communicating with parents is not always within the traditional working hours, and teachers are integrating the use of Apps on phones into their lessons. This was carried out with very reasonable changes which have now been in place since Week 2 of term and all students are managing their additional device time well. Below are the new guidelines.

Sunday HWOP - if students are at EC, they may have a phone. Hand in devices for 1 hour when they return to the boarding house.

FROM THE HEAD OF JUNIOR School

DEAR JUNIOR SCHOOL FAMILIES,

AS THE TERM TICKS BY SO DOES THE MEDIA AND WHAT THEY REPORTED ABOUT THIS WEEK.

At the end of the holidays we heard about the age old debate on Bullying.

Bullying is a critical issue for schools, as it can lead to negative impacts for the person being bullied, bystanders, the person doing the bullying and the school. Providing opportunities for students to understand what constitutes bullying, and to learn to recognise it within their school community, is a key part of an effective bullying prevention program.

Definitions of bullying

Perhaps the meaning of the word bullying has expanded in our community. Taking psychological or medical words which have specific definitions and incorporating them into our everyday speech is widespread. Nobody is sad anymore, we are depressed; if someone is neat and tidy they have OCD; nobody gets a cold anymore, it's the flu.

Perhaps bullying is now so broadly defined and even carelessly used that it has lost the specific meaning it had. So what is bullying?

It's more than just a fight or disliking someone.

It's being mean to someone over and over again.

Bullying is when someone or a group of people who have more power than you, repeatedly use words or actions to hurt you.

Bullying can happen anywhere – at home, with friends, in a group, on the bus or at school.

Why do people bully others?

There are lots of reasons why someone might bully others. Whatever the reason, bullying is never okay.

Someone who bullies another person might:

- Feel jealous
- Want others to like them
- Want to feel better about themselves
- · Want to fit in with their friends
- Feel angry inside
- · Like to be in control or have power over others
- Have been bullied themselves
- · Not know what they're doing is wrong

Why meaning matters

Because student bullying is usually carried out without adults being present it is difficult for teachers and parents to know about it. Even when adults are present the behaviour can be very subtle and difficult to recognise. If we add this to the fact that we often differ in what we think bullying is, it makes the situation very difficult both to prevent and manage.

So it is important if we use the word bully that everybody agrees on the meaning. We need to distinguish between aggression, bullying and nastiness. I think it is useful to think of aggressive behaviour as the umbrella term, with bullying as one type of aggression distinguished by intention, repetition and an imbalance of power.

Nastiness is people being mean to each other but without necessarily repetition or the imbalance of power.

Why we need to agree is this determines how we manage the harmful incident. If two children are fighting, there is a repercussion for both of them and we try to teach them to solve their differences more constructively. If one child is bullying another child, it is unfair to punish both of them. The victim did not do anything wrong, and often punishment doesn't change the bully's behaviour. Some may say, it is natural to assume "once a bully, always a bully." But tagging a person who bullies with a label of "bully" for the rest of his life does not help prevent bullying. The key is to catch the bullying early, intervene and educate. This early intervention involves not only disciplining the bully for his/her poor choices but also equipping him/her with the skills he/she needs to interact with others in positive ways...

Conflict in our lives can be functional or dysfunctional. Bullying is always dysfunctional for the victim, the bully and the witnesses. We can't avoid conflict and disagreement, but we don't have to abuse our power to hurt others. https://kidshelpline.com.au/teens/issues/ bullying

Understanding that students can have different opinions is a key message and that an argument over a topic is natural, however the balance of power needs to stay equal. At this stage it is alright for a student to step back and evaluate the situation. 'Does this need to continue? Have I got my opinion across to whom it is intended for? Who is the real winner?

On a playground this is a common event around Australia. The next step for some students is if this is a common occurrence with a good friend then it moves down the line into a toxic friendship.

John Marsden was in the papers recently with his opinion on bullying which the media has criticised him for. While reading some articles for this newsletter I came across an interesting blog from a parent/teacher which was asking schools to help educate parents on calling everything bullying. She went on to say throughout her life as a teacher and mother she heard on-going stories of brother/ brother, sister/sister and sister/brother fighting on a regular basis with usually one of the siblings being the more dominant one. Looking at the facts of this

- Is there an imbalance of power =YES

- If this is the case, then is this bullying?

JUNIOR SCHOOL OOSHIES IN THE PLAYGROUND

It is inevitable that with Woolworths marketing of ooshies, students will bring them to school for the purpose of trading.

Trading of ooshies provides opportunities for students to develop and strengthen skills of negotiation, fairness, communication and most importantly, integrity.

Teachers have had conversations with our students regarding fairness in trading and being respectful to the opinions of others as to whether they consider a fair trade, or indeed, whether they would like to trade at all.

As is often the case in such negotiations, we as teachers have had a number of scenarios already, where students feel unhappy with the results. It would be the easiest solution to simply ban ooshies at school and rid the playground of the source of these social confrontations. However, with further thought and professional discussion, we have asked ourselves whether the banning of ooshies is actually beneficial when teaching our children life skills?

It is a common topic in psychology and parenting articles that "wrapping kids in cotton wool" does not allow them to develop the essential skills of risk-taking, learning from mistakes, problemsolving and facing challenges and failures. Such trial and error can be fundamental to negotiating life's challenges and overcoming them, skills we want our children to easily access as they grow. So, moving forward, for the time being, we have decided to let the ooshies stay. We would ask that you also initiate conversations with your children:



- How can your child show fairness, respect and integrity when trading?
- Be honest about the "value" of the ooshie
- · Do not pressure others into trading
- How can we manage fair trading?
- Only taking a small number, such as 5 ooshies to school
- Leave your "favourite" ooshies at home!
- Be sure about your decision, it is difficult to "undo" a completed transaction

It is not our intention to encourage trading as a main source of play, indeed there are far better options on the playground; rather allow for students to have ownership of their choices. Therefore, you and your child may like to consider whether to even participate in trading at school! However, allowing our children/students to participate in the decision-making leads to meaningful learning opportunities and in turn, developing the skills we hope to see in our future leaders.
