From The Head of the **Junior School**

Well, we made it to the last week of Term 2.

I again congratulate our families on their fine efforts managing remote learning this term, I was pleased to hear from many families about how impressed they were with our distance education programme. Prior to COVID-19 we certainly did not envisage that all our students would be accessing our distance education platform. However, students and teachers alike are all pleased to be back learning in our classrooms. Our school report cards during COVID-19 may look a little different taking into consideration the coronavirus pandemic we are experiencing.

The Department of Education have granted to all schools an exception not to grade a student this semester, (as you will know all students are graded to a national benchmark not against each other), and I am sure you will all acknowledge that it could be difficult for teachers to report and grade their students with almost a quarter of the work completed at home.

NEGS has decided to offer families a modified report for Semester 1. The report will include a general comment, A-E mark and detailed content statement for each KLA. When looking at these marks please remember that teachers have had to modify their teaching and reporting procedures. All new students who have not been enrolled for both Terms 1 and 2 at NEGS will be receiving an interim report. This report will then be followed by Parent/Teacher interviews in Week 4 of Term 3.

I am sure you will agree that after many weeks of home learning, teachers do not have the same insight into students' behaviour, understanding and progress as they usually would at this point in the year. Our teachers have commented they are impressed with the way their students have addressed this COVID-19 situation, their reaction to social isolation, returning to classroom routine and learning, their response to missing their friends, and the processes of getting back to normal routines.

Parent/Teacher interviews are scheduled for Week 4 Term 3 faceto-face, however, they may be held over the phone or by Google Meet depending on health regulations.

The countdown is on. As of Wednesday, 17th of June, Year 12 at NEGS only has 100 days left of schooling and we celebrated in as much style as possible.

The school has done its best to ensure the girls are being able to experience everything that they can, however COVID-19 restrictions are an unavoidable obstacle. Nonetheless the girls have persevered and reacted positively towards their situation (a trait that this year group is well known for) and have met the challenges head on. We hope that their last term will be one of enjoyment and that they can cram in all of the events that they can to make their final days memorable.

We look forward to having the rest of the year group return to boarding and returning to full capacity. Year 12 we are so proud of you!







COVID-19 Update

UNWELL STUDENTS

We request that you do not send any student to school who is exhibiting ANY signs of illness or states they are feeling unwell.

We also ask that if you answer 'yes' to any of the following 3 questions, that you keep your child at home and contact the Health Centre (6774 8700) to discuss.

- Has anyone in your household been in close contact with a confirmed case of COVID-19 in the last 14 days?
- Has anyone recently returned from traveling?
- Does anyone in your household have any of the following symptoms? Fever, cough, sore throat, fatigue or shortness of breath?

In the event that a student needs to be tested please inform the school immediately. Before returning to school we require a certificate from their GP stating they have returned a negative result for COVID-19 and are fit to return to school. If your child receives a negative result, we still ask that you keep your child home until all symptoms of illness have passed.

Despite some reports from the Government about social distancing in schools, our situation is different as we are considered a residential facility. Restrictions about no adults on campus remains the same as does the restrictions for drop offs and pickups.

The situation remains fluid and all changes are made in consultation with the advice from the Australian Government Department of Health, NSW Health, Australian Health Protection Principal Committee (AHPPC) and the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA).





COMPULSORY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Information for parents and carers

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. Schools work in partnership with parents and carers to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

Legal responsibilities for

PARENTS AND CARERS



Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with NSW Education Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of

ARRIVING ON TIME



Arriving at school and class on time:

- Makes sure that students do not miss out on important learning activities early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to spend time with their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents or carers.



Absences FROM SCHOOL



Sometimes your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment during school hours
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstances (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence, you must provide your child's school with an explanation of the absence within seven school days. However, the school may contact you to discuss the absence if they have not received an explanation from you within two days.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens, the principal will let you know the reasons why they have made this decision.

The school may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long-term absences are explained as being due to the child's illness. Principals may also seek parent's permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the absences can be recorded as unjustified.

When your child has difficulties

ATTENDING SCHOOL



You should contact the school as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to support within the school or linking your child with appropriate external support networks.

The principal may seek your assistance to help develop an Attendance Improvement Plan that identifies the issues that prevent your child from attending school regularly and collaborates with you and your child to seek strategies to enable your child to get to school.

Consequences of

CONTINUED ABSENCES



Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference that is convened by a person authorised by the Secretary of the NSW Department of Education. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place, so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

The Compulsory Schooling Conference is the final school-based intervention that can be taken to address matters of unsatisfactory school attendance. It is important to understand that the school may refer the case to the Department of Education Legal Services to take further action where children of compulsory school age continue to have unacceptable unexplained or unjustified absences from school, despite attempted interventions at the school level.

• Compulsory Schooling Order


If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department legal staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

Travel during

TERM TIME



In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.



School LEAVING AGE



In New South Wales, students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in **PARTNERSHIP**
