


ACEL Awards Night

COVID Canoe Classic

On Saturday the 31 October, the NEGS Kayak team again took on the challenge of the Hawkesbury Canoe Classic, however, with a bit of twist to the usual course. Due to COVID-19 impacting the ability of the official race to continue, a group of determined NEGS girls, led by Mrs Penny Lehman, devised a course down the Clarence river. The COVID-19 Classic was an estimated 40km paddle starting at the edge of Cophenhurst. While the fitness from going around Malpas dam on a Sunday morning was a sure start, most girls hadn't yet experienced the currents of a river and would soon learn the ropes to controlling a kayak in strong currents and high winds. Battling through the aftermath of high winds and rainfall from the early morning storm, the delayed paddle was underway and the makeshift classic was a large hit with the help of the local SES and PLC Armidale. The grit and strength shown by the girls and their dads' paddling, embodied the NEGS motto fittingly, 'Whatsoever you do, do it heartily'. Throughout the first semester the NEGS Wellbeing Program was in the process of implementing a new program Girls Supporting Girls. The program involved our Year 12 students developing lessons and teaching our Year 7 and 8 students one period a week. Not only would the girls from the younger years learn from the older girls but it would also allow them to develop a connection with the older students and give them someone to whom they could talk. Unfortunately, due to COVID-19, the implementation of the program has been postponed, however, we look forward to working with the program in the near future.

With the change to online learning the Wellbeing program shifted its focus to how to support students, Year Advisors and Tutors have been engaging in weekly Google Meets with their tutor groups. Some of the great ideas from our Tutors included:

- physical activity challenges
- mindfulness sessions
- goal setting
- providing an opportunity for students to discuss the challenges they may be facing while learning from home.

When classes resumed in Term 3, the face to face Wellbeing Program also recommenced with a focus assisting the students with readjusting to face to face lessons. Also, during the second semester, the Wellbeing Program was adapted to link in with the current issues faced around COVID-19.

Another program that was run for Year 10 was Love Bites. Love Bites is a Respectful Relationships Education Program for young people aged 15-17 years. It consists of two interactive programs: one on Relationship Violence, and one on Sex and Relationships, followed by creative workshops and community campaigns. Love Bites aims to provide young people with a safe environment in which to examine, discuss and explore respectful relationships.







From the Chaplain

Despite staff changes and the unanticipated COVID-19 setbacks, the Christian Studies and Chaplaincy program at NEGS has thrived throughout 2020. When restrictions kicked in, weekly Chapel services had to be delivered via more creative means, often pre-recorded or conducted in smaller groups. It was wonderful that Junior School Chapel was reinstated, face-to-face, in Semester 2 where we have enjoyed exploring the topics; 'Be Amazed: At the things Jesus said and did' and 'What in the World is Jesus doing now?' This, of course, was all done in the context of loads of fun; dancing, playing games, participating in quizzes and eating chocolate!

In the Senior School (Years 7-10) Christian Studies classes, students have grappled with a variety of topics such as 'Meeting Jesus Face to Face' in the book of Luke, the exploration of competing 'Worldviews', and Discovering Jesus in 'The Lion the Witch and the Wardrobe', to name a few. Girls enthusiastically participate in lively debate and are often surprised by the relevancy of the Bible messages.

We have also continued with the 'Hope Hour' lunchtime groups, with the Junior School program hosting up to 30 students each week! These weekly meetings provide a safe, friendly and relaxed environment where children can investigate the claims of the Bible, in an age-appropriate way. All students and staff are always welcome at these groups.

Chaplaincy at NEGS is a vibrant, well-supported component of school life. The program seeks to offer students and staff Christian care and guidance, faithful Bible teaching and the opportunity to explore the hope offered by Jesus Christ. What a terrific spring! Next year's Limousin cross exhibition steers I'm very proud of our HSC Agriculture girls this year who really have been turned out for the summer break onto an abundance of pasture, as with our Dohne/ White Suffolk/ Poll Dorset lambs who are now powering along after weaning. Thankfully, both our Berkshire sows are pregnant and will farrow next term. They have been joined to a Landrace cross Large White boar so we should have some excellent cross bred porkers. Our Heritage White pullets are all in full lay now with the remainder to be sold before

Finally, with some decent rain, our mixed fruit orchard is starting to really get away so hopefully there will be some terrific fresh fruit in the future.

The Stage 5 Agriculture class, as part of their plant production unit, have completed designing and sowing a pasture trial with six local popular species to be tested. This trial should grow well over the summer with dry matter results to be collected next year. A big thank you to Mr Craig Chapman (NEGS parent) from our local Grazag for organising seed for our students.

Stage 4 Technology/ Agriculture have designed and created poultry automated drinkers and feeders from recycled materials this term and completed a comprehensive portfolio to complement their design. There were some terrific ideas on display.



EQUESTRIAN CENTRE

2020 HAS CERTAINLY BEEN AN UNUSUAL YEAR FOR EVERYBODY WITH MANY CHALLENGES, HOWEVER, NEGS EQUESTRIAN CENTRE AND OUR RIDERS HAVE COME OUT THE OTHER END DETERMINED, RESILIENT AND RE-ENERGISED.

Before COVID-19 restrictions took effect, NEGS held our very first Interschool event in March which was very successful by all accounts. There was a Showjumping competition on Feb 6th and a Dressage Competition on 29 Feb. As a part of the 125 Year Celebration NEGS also ran all the horse events for the Armidale Show on March 6-7.

After a term of school closure during which we lost our Gap student-helpers and many key staff, we reopened in Term 3 with a new team on board and a goal to provide a busy program of internal clinics, including regular fortnightly coaching from Triple Gold Medalist, Matt Ryan. We attended an in-house demonstration on PEMF Pulse Therapy and talked about worming schedules with Virbac. Highlights of Term 3 were providing students with lots of high level training opportunities including Dressage with Peter Shaw, Show Riding with Les Friend and Breakaway Roping with Crooked Creek Ranch. We had a very successful student-led Jump for Chocolate competition, attended Armidale Riding Club Official Dressage Competition and ran an internal End of Term Extravaganza in all disciplines which was a huge success and lots of fun to end the term.

Unfortunately, we were unable to hold our Annual One Day Event or attend any of our usual Interschool competitions such as ISHE, North West Expo and SIEC, some of which could not go ahead as usual. Some students were able to get out later in the term and during holidays to attend a few events with parents. We made the most of what was available locally by attending another Armidale Riding Club Official Dressage Day, some students attended a Hack Show run by ARC and we hosted many more clinics in Term 4 including Trick Riding, a bison clinic, Dan Steers Horsemanship, Les Friend, Peter Shaw, Andrew Cooper for Showjumping, and we were very fortunate to have continued fortnightly training with Matt Ryan for eventing. Some eventers were able to get out and about when Quirindi ODE ran with a new date in late October. As events started to open again, riders took all opportunities to get out and compete under COVID-19 restrictions. In November, students were able to attend Ashford Campdraft, NENWSHA Spring Hack Show at Gunnedah, Tamworth International Eventing weekend and a team of eight riders made it to ENSW Schoolies Champs at SIEC in Sydney in late November. In addition, we learned about ulcers in a scoping demonstration with Randlab and our local equine Vet, and finished the year with another fun and challenging End of Term

It was great to see the Equestrian Centre a hive of activity again with many smiling faces and much camaraderie. NEGS EC is feeling rejuvenated with an enthusiastic new team, a passionate new parent group with amazing ideas and skills to volunteer, a new 2021 Senior Leadership team and all students preparing themselves by stepping out of their comfort zones and ready themselves for the prospect of getting out to more competitions again soon. We look forward to an even better year in 2021!

NEGS IS FORTUNATE TO HAVE AN EXTENSIVE COLLECTION OF MEMORABILIA, COLLECTED OVER THE YEARS AND LATER CURATED BY MRS JEAN NEWALL, FORMER TEACHER AND LIBRARIAN AT NEGS AND ARCHIVIST 1978-2015. IN EARLY DAYS, MEMORABILIA WAS SIMPLY CARED FOR IN MANY PLACES BY INTERESTED STAFF AND OLD GIRLS/OLD STAFF, AND THEN IT FOUND A HOME IN ONE OF THE OLDEST PARTS OF THE SCHOOL: TWO FORMER DORMITORIES WHICH WERE BUILT IN 1918 CALLED BLAXLAND AND WENTWORTH. THESE ARE NOW DEMOLISHED.

The Archives are now housed very comfortably in the former Music Block, built in 1923. On 17 September 1994, this sturdy building was recommissioned as an Archive Centre and later named the Jean Newall Archive Centre, honouring all Jean Newall's many years in NEGS service. It contains 14 rooms which were music teaching and practice rooms until 1993. Most of these rooms house specialised displays of memorabilia of the history of the school such as the yearbooks ('The Chronicle') from 1909, uniform pieces from 1911, past science and technology equipment, formal Chapel vestments and vessels, a music room with an original piano, record player and other accoutrements, crested china and embroidered linen and educational teaching and learning books and equipment as well as many photographic albums and clippings collections.

We encourage all students, Old Girls, parents and community members to come in and browse and enjoy the collection.





Extract from our 2020 Year 12 Valedictory Key Note Speech: Rechelle Leahy

Hello. I am truly honoured to stand here and speak to you all today. A million years ago, I was just like you sitting in an auditorium listening to some old dude waxing lyrical about their life and providing a prescription to success...

Well, lucky you, I'm no dude (although old is arguable) and I am absolutely not going to provide you with a prescription for success, because, to be honest, success is in the eye of the beholder, bear with me...I will come back to that.

I guess I should give you the CliffsNotes version of me...so according to my LinkedIn profile:

I've done a lot of 'stuff' – I have worked in Canberra for over 20 years and am the Vice President of the National Rural Women's Coalition. I sit on numerous Boards including the NRWC, the Classification Review Board and the Northern Tablelands Local Land Service to name a few.

I have had a hugely varied career including running my own hotel (let me tell you that teaches you skills, dealing with difficult people and learning to have your voice heard – I recommend you try it at least once!) to negotiating the Australia – US Free Trade Agreement, and writing the Commonwealth Procurement Guidelines and Rules.

I have also had the opportunity to represent Australia in New York at the United Nations as part of the Commission for the Status of Women twice, and here is where I truly grew my voice in advocacy.

My real passion is rural, regional and remote women and girls and advocating for our needs, for services and for more amplification of our voices to government overall. I am passionate about advocacy and ensuring we are all working towards equality.

Out of this work, I have been nominated for an Impact25 Award with Pro Bono Australia in 2018 and 2019 and I am an Australian Financial Review - 100 Women of Influence 2019.

My passion is working with government and non-government agencies on legislative reform, advocacy and research to contribute towards a better future for RRR Australia.

When I read this profile, I often think – who is that, and when did I find the time to do all of that, but what I stress to you is this is a LIFETIME (to date) of work. It has taken over 20 years, so I implore you to not look at these profiles and think you will never get there, you absolutely will, you will take your own path, it WILL be bumpy, but you will do it in your own way.

I was told that, at the beginning of the year, you took on a motto to lead by, and for you, the 2020 cohort, you chose 'Why not!' – meaning give everything a go, just do it, take advantage of every opportunity.... So, I nerdishly fist pumped and thought now THAT I can get on board – THAT I am here for!

I figured why not (see what I did there) - if I can't be an inspiration I can at least be a warning right!

And so here we are, me having accepted the unenviable task of launching you into the wide blue yonder with some inspiring thoughts after these 'unprecedented' times! (p.s if I NEVER hear that word again it won't be too soon!!).

What a year 2020 has been – the fact that you are all here right now, having completed 13 years of schooling, and you all seem relatively intact... bravo to you! You should be really proud of yourselves, always remember to celebrate the wins – even the smallest, these are so important.

There is soooo much chatter these days about the importance of authenticity: 'Be yourself, everyone else is already taken' right?

I have long been a lone voice in many environments in which I have worked, especially male dominated Board positions and other non-traditional roles. It is absolutely an act of courage to be unashamedly you, to use your voice and be heard.

It also doesn't hurt to be a little cheeky — a great story I can tell you is when I was appointed to a particularly male dominated Board. I was taken around the hallowed halls by a fellow (male) Board member and he was showing me all of these amazing old photos of the history of the previous Boards...as you can imagine what I saw were A LOT of men...so in my own inimitable way, I said wow these are a fantastic reflection of the history of the Board and those women all had really short hair... don't be afraid to speak your truth, being a little tongue in cheek sometimes!

The one thing I want you to take away from this conversation is that pushing past self-doubt, the fear, expectations (your own or others) and the willingness to work towards establishing a new way is not only an act of compassion, it is from where true advocacy comes.

Authenticity is where the magic happens.

As I said earlier – success is in the eye of the beholder. Sure, this can be awards and recognition BUT, more importantly, it is about waking up every day and being proud of who you are and towards what you are working. Don't lose sight of your goals and take the set-backs with the wins; you learn from all of it.

If there is one thing I want you to take away from this speech today is WHY NOT YOU? Why not be the first female on an all-male Board, why not become the lead engineer on major infrastructure projects, or be a lawyer, a teacher or an artist. Opportunity comes from effort – be willing to give it a go!

If I hadn't said 'why not' to the National Rural Women's Coalition, I would not have represented Australia at the United Nations Commission for the Status of Women, I would not have advocated with world leaders about rural, regional and remote Australian women and our needs. The sooner I stopped worrying about what other people thought of me and my choices, the higher I flew.

SO I ask you:

Why not you?

Thank you for allowing me to speak today after what has been a completely crazy year and congratulations for making it! Bring on 2021!



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
