

A significant number of our courses achieved stellar results.

- All Music 1 students studied Voice and received Band 6 results. In addition, we were privileged to enjoy some memorable performances from them throughout the year at significant School events.
- Two-thirds of our Visual Arts students received a Band 6.
- In Agriculture, most students received a Band 5 or 6, achieving marks significantly above the state average.
- Half of our PDHPE students received a Band 5, or above.
- The entirety of the Ancient History, and Design and Technology classes received a Band 5 significantly above the state mean.
- All Biology, Drama, Physics, Textiles and Design, and Advanced English students received a Band 4 or above.
- Across the Year 12 cohort, students studied 25 HSC subjects, with Band 6 results achieved in five of them: Agriculture, Mathematics Advanced, PDHPE, Music 1 and Visual Arts.

Students who desired university courses, received placement offers through their results or early entry into their chosen path. This year, some have started their tertiary studies, and others are enjoying a gap year. A number are now well-entrenched into the workforce.

We know how well-equipped and resilient the Class of 2020 are, and we are confident of their future success. We look forward to following their post-NEGS journey.

THE OFFICIAL OPENING OF THE

NEGS Regional Sporting Complex

The Complex defines NEGS as a regional school with facilities that surpass many large metropolitan schools.

After three years, Member for New England, Barnaby Joyce officially opened the NEGS Regional Sporting Complex on Thursday, 22 April 2021. This new \$3.7 million multi-purpose facility will benefit the students and the entire New England community. The Sporting Complex, funded through philanthropic donations to the School, is among the best multi-sport venues in the region, providing NEGS' athletes with a state-of-the-art facility for daily training and competition.

The Complex features a synthetic hockey field, built to Federation of International Hockey (FIH) Standards, seven netball courts, five tennis courts resurfaced with artificial turf, plus a rugby field. It marks the most ambitious

infrastructure project at NEGS. However, the complex also defines NEGS as a regional school with facilities that surpass many large metropolitan schools and with programs supported by NSW Rugby, Hockey NSW, Netball NSW and the UNE Lions.

The Armidale community has also benefited hugely from the NEGS Regional Sporting Complex, as it is available for external training, sporting camps and competition. For example, early this year, Mark Knowles, Olympic Gold Medallist and former Captain of Australian Hockey Kookaburras, and Caitlyn Nevins, from the Australian Diamonds hosted hockey and netball clinics. NEGS was also a joint host

of the Under 15s State Hockey Championship Carnival.

We are indebted to Old Girl Jeannie Ross Fraser, whose initial bequest dared NEGS to conceive, design, and build such a long-lasting and beneficial project. We are grateful for the generosity of benefactors Annette and John Cassidy, for their contribution to this project. As well as the generosity of Sally (nee McLaughlin '74) and John Grimble, the Armidale and Queensland Branches of the NEGS Alumni who funded the Goalposts and Electronic Scoreboard. The completion of the Sporting Complex has come at the end of a particularly tough time for Regional NSW, following drought, fires, floods and COVID-19, making the realisation of this project even more special.

To celebrate the Complex's opening, NEGS hockey players participated in a two-hour private session with Mark Knowles (Hockey Olympian), followed by a clinic attended by 55 children from the wider Armidale hockey community.

Guest speakers at the official opening included The Hon Barnaby Joyce, Mr John Cassidy (Chair NEGS Board), Senator Bridget McKenzie, Mr David Thompson (CEO of Hockey NSW) and Mr Mark Knowles (Hockey Olympian). In addition, the Honourable Marise Payne, Minister for Women and Foreign Affairs recorded a particularly poignant message as she couldn't be in attendance on the night.

Everyone felt proud to be part of the NEGS community and excited for the sporting opportunities available to our boys and girls. Parents, Alumni and Friends of NEGS all attended the event and key members of Armidale's community, including the University

of New England, the Mayor, Armidale Regional Council, and various sporting bodies. We even got to see Barnaby Joyce and Professor Brigid Heywood (Vice-Chancellor of UNE) hit a hockey ball!

The night ended with a hockey game under lights; NEGS vs The 'Rest of the Best' of Armidale. Mark Knowles donned a NEGS jersey and, with his help, the NEGS girls were victorious 1:0. An incredible opportunity for the girls to play with or against one of Australia's greatest ever hockey players. The only goal scored was by Year 12 student Olivia Clarke.

LEGACY OF JEANNIE ROSS FRASER

A Transformational Gift

We are indebted to Old Girl Jeannie Ross Fraser, whose initial bequest dared NEGS to conceive, design, and build such a long-lasting and beneficial project.



Jeannie Ross Fraser was born in 1923 in Glen Innes. Her mother, Margaret Pearl Chaffey, matron of Inverell Hospital, married David John Fraser, a mechanical engineer from Inverness, in 1922. They lived in camps around Coolatai and Yetman in the early years, where Jeannie's father was a successful water boring contractor. Their mobile home was a large tent surrounded by a wooden frame covered by fly wire.

Jeannie began her education, like many in those days, by correspondence. Then, on the advice of Bishop Moyes and his wife, she enrolled at NEGS. Jeannie started her NEGS education in 1939. She was a few years older than most of her classmates; however, that didn't seem to matter. In Jeannie's words, 'thus, as a 16-year-old, began a marvellous four years amongst wonderful friends who understood, and loved and helped me with a most genuine concern, both teachers and fellow pupils.' The NEGS motto 'Whatever you do, do it unto the Lord, do it for good' she said had always acted as a guiding light for her. On being asked years later about her first impressions of boarding school, she replied, 'The noise!'

Jeannie's father died in October 1942, and her mother ten months later, so her guardian, Gordon Fraser (her father's cousin), supported her for the last two years of school.

When Jeannie arrived at NEGS, she wasn't considered 'academic' but was well educated in worldly affairs. Her father encouraged her to read the newspapers every day. So, she was always well informed about what was going on in the world. One of her old NEGS friends remembers that her father almost interrogated her with questions


on world affairs. Her classmates were not as interested in the rest of the world, except for what was happening in the war. Everyone had a brother or sister in the Army, so they were all worried about that.

At 20, Jeannie passed the Leaving Certificate with an A in English and Bs for her other subjects. However, at the last minute, she had to add Art to make up enough subjects – about which she wrote airily... 'Not that I could draw or paint, but the history of Art was relatively easy to learn and most interesting!'

Jeannie began her nursing career at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital in Sydney. There were eight girls from NEGS doing their nursing training at the same time. Jeannie did four years of nursing at RPA and then went to Launceston to complete the study of Midwifery at Queen Victoria Hospital. In 1951, she ended up in London and continued to nurse there. She worked at Westminster Hospital for 18 months. With the hospital providing staff for Buckingham Palace, she was privy to the arrangements that went into setting up an operating theatre in the palace for surgery on King George VI. When the king died and was lying-in-state, in St Stephens Hall, Westminster, there were always nurses in attendance as an Honour Guard. Jeannie was with the first nurses on duty.

She returned to Sydney in 1954 and spent the rest of her working life as Theatre Sister at the Royal Alexandra Hospital for Children until her retirement in 1985. Jeannie returned to Glen Innes, where she bought her first house, having never had a home, having always lived in the Nurses Home.

Jeannie was very active in the Glen



Innes community. She was a member of several organisations, including the Red Cross, Back to Glen Innes Week Committee, Meals on Wheels, Glen Innes Bowling Club and the Glen Innes Writers' Group. She was also a patron of the Glen Innes and District Historical Society and curator of the medical section at the museum, called 'The Jeannie Ross Fraser Memorial Medical Wing'. Jeannie also made numerous donations to the RPA's Education Trust.

Jeannie died in 2016, aged 92. She was a very quiet, private individual who lived a frugal life but dedicated herself to her work and community.

JUNIOR SCHOOL

Exciting Start to 2021

This year's identified priority area is our approach to Literacy. With the inclusion of 'Little Learners Love Literacy' into our Early Years' Program, NEGS Junior School remains committed to implementing current, evidence-based best practices and pedagogy. All staff have been involved in a series of collaborative opportunities to ensure Literacy is taught explicitly and systematically, across all cohorts. Research notes the elements of phonemic instruction, phonics, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension for reading instruction as crucial.

We continue to celebrate our students, their families and our school community. What we learnt from last year in building resilience in these times of uncertainty is key to promoting mental health and wellbeing. Drawing on the principles of positive psychology and supported by the Grow Your Mind Program, students have engaged in activities emphasising the understanding of character traits that build future leaders.

In Term 2, Stage Three participated in the 'Illuminate JNR Challenge'. This exciting program introduces key skills to develop leadership and consider what it takes to think like an entrepreneur and succeed in education into the future. Facilitated by skilled staff from Illuminate Education, and with the local business community's support, students learnt about solving a relevant problem in the world, developing and refining an idea, looking at how to make it financially viable, and present it compellingly – all skills needed for success.

Our staff and students are not alone

in driving the strength of our school: it comes from our culture and community. This has been clearly evident at our many events held this semester. The way our students and the wider NEGS community support each student across the many facets of school life is a testament to the values that underpin NEGS. These events allow for our students to step out of their comfort zone and experience success in different environments.

A Snapshot of our Community and Connections

Class Dojo

NEGS Junior School implemented the use of Class Dojo across Pre-K to Year 6. This program allows us to build our classroom community with teachers sharing learning moments, with parents/carers, through their class stories.

Stage 1 enjoyed their excursion to our local dairy goat farm, focusing on learning more about sustainability and the impact that drought has on farming. While they were there, they learned about farming and the extensive range of goat products, including tasting goat cheese and milk.

Students across the Junior School participated in fun activities to celebrate Harmony Day. The activities focused on celebrating diversity, fostering inclusiveness and respect.

DaVinci Decathlon

Pre-K-1 Mini Olympics afternoon


Our Early Years teachers hosted a fun-filled afternoon with parent/student collaborations and

YEAR 11 AND 12 ART/DESIGN/TEXTILES

Excursion to Sydney



It was exciting to attend the 2021 Art/ Design/Textiles Excursion to Sydney this year. Year 11 and 12 Visual Arts, Design and Technology, and Textiles and Design students all caught the train to Sydney in April, for a long weekend of galleries, exhibitions, and design workshops.

The Visual Arts students had the opportunity to see works at the Art Gallery of New South Wales, Museum of Contemporary Art, Carriageworks, the S.H. Ervin and the White Rabbit galleries. The events of 2020 have impacted the art and design industry in Sydney, as well as worldwide. Many of the artworks in 'The National Exhibition: New Australian Art' referenced the impact of COVID-19 Lockdowns, the influence of the Black Lives Matters movement, the devastation of the bushfires last summer and 'connection' as a concept across cultures and circumstances. A highlight was visiting 'Lumen' at the White Rabbit in Chippendale. This exhibition allowed the students to interact and play with light in a series of works that all respond to the theme of light.

The design students saw works in the 2021 Shape exhibition at the

Powerhouse Museum, displaying some of the exemplary HSC Major projects from the 2020 Design and Technology, Textile and Design and Industrial Technology students. Visiting and talking with Sydney designers, Eloise Panetta (dyes fabric with botanical materials) and Caroline Reddie (furniture designer), was an invaluable experience as it allowed the students to see and understand design practice and processes. A trend with these two designers, and many others now, is a focus on sustainability and individual design (as opposed to mass-manufactured/mass-produced design), allowing users to choose and adapt designs to their own needs according to an interchangeable design palette.

The hands-on experience of silkscreen printing some designs onto paper at Signature Prints was a favourite for many students. Equally exciting was visiting some of the textile shops in Surry Hills for inspiration and fabric for future projects. The students gained so much knowledge and experience in a short time. A big thank you to Ms Hodges and Ms Ronald for accompanying the students on the excursion.

For the Livestock Team, Term 1 2021 was spent busily preparing our students and cattle for the Armidale and Walcha Shows. These were our first opportunities to show off our fabulous steers Lava, Bevis, Bundy and Max, and the first show for a number of our students.

We had a very successful Armidale Show, with results in the Paraders' Class as follows:

The students have been fantastic olive harvesters in horticulture, using racks and traps to bring in the crop. With an emphasis on 'paddock to plate', the students processed and preserved the olives they harvested.

In the fat lamb enterprise, boarders ensure our fat lambs are fed, producing a great pen of lamb destined for the market in early Term 4. We plan to investigate new fencing, pasture measurement and increasing the number of 1st cross ewes for an ANZAC Day mating in 2022.

In the beef enterprise, livestock health has been a priority, with students involved in activities such as applying pour-on lice control.

We have several activities underway for the remainder of the year, including:

- One of our rare Italian ducks is currently sitting on a clutch of eggs. This will be our second hatching for the year.
- Our young sows have an off-site visit. Hopefully, they will return pregnant, with piglets to be born over the Christmas break.
- The orchard has been pruned, and we look forward to monitoring the spring growth and crop.
- Our Year 8 students will each be given a plot of land in 2022 to grow some vegetables of their choosing.

Chocolate brownies and caramel slices seem to be favourites for afternoon teas.



For Prep, the Years 5 to 10 Boarders are supervised and assisted in various ways, in two rooms in the library. Should some concerns arise and not be covered in Prep, contact is made with the relevant day school Stage Adviser/class teacher. Class teachers can also contact the relevant House Mother to alert her to issues that could be dealt with in Prep. Prep is set so that, for the first half-hour, work is done individually. Following this is the opportunity for peer tutoring to be covered. This has proven very successful as students, in many cases, understand their work more if they are talking to a peer about it. For Years 5 to 8, enrichment activities are provided for those who complete their Prep work early. Opportunities have also existed for the older Boarders to help younger ones outside Prep time. It is important, from a Boarding viewpoint, for all year levels to be covering Prep at the same time, to avoid distractions from other disciplines. The Year 11s are now in one room for their Prep time with their House Mother supervising and assisting them where possible, including with time management. Peer tutoring for this group has proved most successful.

Our inaugural two SBAs (Student Boarding Assistants) have successfully completed their term in White House, assisting the House Mothers. SBAs duties have included: overseeing hand-in times for IT equipment, helping with homework, assisting with lights out check on weekends, spending time with Boarders facing challenges, organising and leading games on weekends. Next term's SBAs are enthusiastically waiting in the wings for their rewarding opportunity to begin.

Picnic time on the tennis court is undoubtedly a creative choice when one's big sister arrives to catch up on Boarding news and share her tips on life. With around 50 hectares of space on campus, our Boarders and their visitors are free to roam. Families and friends are most welcome to visit the campus after making prior arrangements with Boarding staff.

2021 has been quieter than usual for the Sydney Alumni Committee but still productive.



Some great insights into the Thoroughbred Racing Industry with Kate Dallimore (2012)



What is your current role with the Equine Industry? What do you love about your current position?

My current role is Marketing and Nominations at Kitchwin Hills. We're probably publicly best known for breeding recent Melbourne Cup winner Vow and Declare, and The Everest winner Yes Yes Yes. Although my job is predominantly in the office dealing with bookings for our two stallions and marketing, I love that I'm still able to be involved with the horses. I get to incorporate all aspects from foaling mares on the farm, and covering with the stallions and yearling preparation.

Have you had mentors along the way? How did you find these mentors?

Plenty! My current bosses would have to be two of my biggest mentors, Pauline Alix and Mick Malone. They've taught me so much in my time at Kitchwin Hills. They have allowed me to reach my full potential by giving me many opportunities and confidence. My other two biggest mentors would be Paul Thompson and Claire Bird of Gerry Harvey's Baramul Stud. Claire taught me a lot on the administration side of things and to continually chase after my dreams, no matter how big they might be! Paul has taught me so much of

my horsemanship skills and many people skills, like management of staff. There are so many other people within the industry who have taught me so much as well. It's one of the few industries where a lot of the knowledge is subjective, meaning you can take a little piece of everyone's expertise and create your perspective.

What was something you learnt during your time at NEGS that is helping you in your role today?

One thing I learnt at NEGS was to always go after what made you happy. When I was younger, I was often told that there's

no money in horses or it's just a phase, but following my passion has led me to where I am today. NEGS gifted me with people skills and treating everyone you meet with respect and (usually) you'll be respected back.

What is your favourite memory of NEGS?

There's way too many to name! But, my favourite memories are definitely in the Boarding House. The bond you create with each other is like family and it is just like living with your best mates.

What is your funniest memory of NEGS?

There's honestly too many to name.

What would you say to a current NEGS student about life after NEGS? Did you know what you wanted to do when you finished school?

I would say to take your time and don't rush to have everything figured out or think there's a timeline to achieve everything! Instead, go at your own pace, figure out who you are first, and follow your instincts about what you should be doing in life. For example, I knew I wanted to be involved in some management role or marketing role but never thought I'd be able to combine the two as well as adding horses into the equation.

What would you say to current NEGS students about navigating the balance between horses and studies? What helped you to manage this?

I'd encourage you to keep focused on your studies, as well as following your passion for riding. Although your Year 12 marks are not everything, they will gift you a certain level of freedom and opportunity. If you don't have a clear view of what you'd like to do when you finish school, at least getting the best marks you possibly can gives you every opportunity. Don't sell yourself short!

Reflections from Jennifer Thomas NEGS Old Girl 1983-1986 and current NEGS parent.

All three of our girls attended NEGS: Ebony (2015-2018), Sophia (2016-2019) and Saskia, who is just about to sit the HSC (2017-2021). The girls' Aunts, Nicola Coupland (Thomas) and Helen O'Neil (Thomas), also attended NEGS. Nicola was Head Girl in 1983.

Having lived in one of the most beautiful parts of the world, Noosa, we as a family returned to Armidale in 2011. Though the girls missed the beach, we had plenty of friends who welcomed us into the community - I had grown up in Armidale and Simon had gone to UNE.

Most of us have the opportunity to go to the beach, but not everyone can visit friends on large, working properties and muster sheep or help with the harvest, go skiing on private dams and attend parties in woolsheds! These experiences are gifts!

I had often thought about the possibility of sending the girls to NEGS, having had such a memorable experience there myself. For me, my years at NEGS gave me friendships and experiences that I would never have had otherwise. The opportunity to attend a school with girls from all over Australia and the world opened up my world to endless possibilities and dreams. Girls from big cities, girls from huge properties, girls from other parts of the world and girls, like me, from 'across the road'.

NEGS has opened many doors and opportunities for Ebony, Sophia and Saskia, academically and *woolsheds*. In addition, it has helped them prepare for life outside of school. They have always loved their sport, and NEGS, through the Talented Athlete Program (TAP), gave them the chance to take their Netball skills to the next level. The program helped the girls with dedication, commitment, and hard work, not only on the netball court but also in the classroom and, more importantly, in life.

The school should be very proud of this program and the tremendous support and dedication that Mr and Mrs Cohen give the girls. The girls work hard and see the results. It sets them up for good practices for the rest of their lives. They had fantastic opportunities to travel to Sydney and compete on a higher level through TAP. The teams competed against top-level Sydney IGSA teams and came away with more determination, knowledge and experience each trip. There was even one year when NEGS came out on top in the IGSA Netball competition. A great triumph for the girls and their coaches.

All the girls were fortunate enough to have the opportunity to travel through the Round Square Program. Each of them chose to go to South Africa for around six weeks. Ebony went to Cape Town and was a weekly boarder at St Cyprian's. Sophia went to Port Elizabeth with Daisy Meehan. Saskia had quite a different experience going to Johannesburg and living with a family. I



would say her experience would have been the most authentic, living in one of the most potentially dangerous cities in the world with its high security and restrictions in a predominantly black community. While their experiences were all very different, they were life-changing experiences.

Ebony and Sophia now attend St Albert's College in Armidale and continue their Agricultural Business and Teaching studies. They have loved meeting new people at the College and continue to face life's challenges and triumphs. Something NEGS has given them is the confidence and courage to do this.

Saskia has finished Year 12 and is waiting on the HSC to start. It certainly hasn't been easy for these kids the last couple of years but, hopefully, they will all take something positive away from life with COVID-19 and the restrictions we have all experienced. Saskia has applied for a Gap year in the Navy and is waiting to confirm this. Let's hope we can all return to some normality soon so our kids can start living out their dreams and plans they so rightly deserve.
